

2024 Annual Awards



Resident of the Year: Charles Hansen

Charles Hansen is a lifelong resident of Northeast Spokane, with deep roots in the Whitman neighborhood. He graduated from Whitman (1960), Shaw (1963), & Rogers (1966). Living in the same house his parents bought when he was one, Charles has dedicated himself to this community for decades. His service began with volunteering at the downtown library and expanded to roles on various local committees, including the **ZONE Steering Committee, Spokane Transit Authority's Citizens Advisory Committee** and the **Spokane Public Library Board**. As Chair of the **Whitman Neighborhood Council** and a key leader in traffic calming and community development, Charles has driven improvements like safer sidewalks around Whitman schools through the **"Safe Streets for All"** program. He also played a key role in revitalizing Rochester Heights Park, turning it into a welcoming space for families. Always quietly helping without seeking recognition, Charles' unwavering commitment to Northeast Spokane makes him a deserving Resident of the Year.



Agency of the Year: Unify Community Health



Unify offers affordable, **high-quality care** for you, your kids, and your grandparents... Whether you're about to be a new mom, trying to soothe your 6-year-old's toothache, looking for a sports physical for your budding middle-school athlete or helping your homebound grandparents get their medicine...they are an **engaged and valued partner agency** at NECC and part of the fabric that makes Spokane a better place to live, learn and work. While their clients are here, they **provide warm referrals** to help their clients access other basic needs and services, childcare, employment support or utility assistance. They actively engage in NECC to **promote and support community health**.

Partner of the Year: On Track Academy

On Track Academy has stepped up in a huge way to engage students in real world impact benefiting our campus. From the bi-weekly perishable food distribution they run for community, to the mentoring On Track Academy students do at **Regal Elementary School**, students are positively impacting the **Hillyard Community Campus**. New in 2024 they are offering two Wellness Plus classes. Students are defining wellness, describing what it looks like in our neighborhoods, and creating projects to showcase to community so that we know how to proactively support youth mental health and wellness. We celebrate our **ZONE liaison Lori Beaty** for having this vision and energy to continually let students lead. We can't wait for what's next!

What is The ZONE?

The ZONE is a grant-funded, place-based initiative at the Northeast Community Center supporting children, youth, and families in Northeast Spokane. **Resident-led**, ZONE staff co-design programs and engage partners to meet the needs of our neighbors. We build capacity in community-based organizations by **providing funding, training, and data storytelling support**. With ZONE staff embedded in schools and NECC, we **support resident goals so that all children, youth and adults can thrive**.

The ZONE began funding youth programming in 2017. It is so exciting to see students we've supported since elementary school graduating from high school and heading off with confidence to what's next. Our focus is **2-generation education and employment supports, housing stability, wellness, leadership and connection to community**.

ZONE Spotlight: SPARK Central

Holmes Elementary students enrolled in **Level Up** had two opportunities to **publish articles, comics, illustrations, and puzzles in the program's newspaper** (the West Central Express). The West Central Express: Arts Edition in March 2024 celebrated student cartoons, paintings, sculptures, collages, photographs, and poems. Staff tailored the second annual newspaper of the year to be culturally responsive to students' communities and interests, publishing the West Central Express: Summer Guide, containing recommendations for summer events and activities, illustrations, and reader's theater scripts imagined, written, and edited by enrolled students.



Hillyard Farmer's Market

The Hillyard Farmer's Market highlights how NECC and The ZONE work with partners to bring resources and opportunities to residents. From June to October, the market offers fresh food and local art, with residents able to use benefits like **EBT**, **WIC**, and **Senior Checks** right in their community.

The Hillyard Farmer's Market occurs weekly. Once a month, The ZONE boosts the outdoor market with **free food** and **43 community partners** tabling on Cook St, offering resources and opportunities so that families can thrive.



Community Involvement

ZONE Resident Steering Committee

The ZONE Steering Committee is a resident-led group shaping our community's direction. Local residents meet regularly, supported by staff, to discuss priorities and guide our programming and investments, ensuring they reflect the true needs of the neighborhood. Through their involvement, members continue their leadership journey and make a lasting impact. The ZONE supports this growth by funding leadership certificates through **Gonzaga University** and other training programs, and encouraging participation in the **Neighborhood Leadership Academy, Neighborhood Councils, and parent teacher organizations**.

Each year, the steering committee identifies **key priorities** to focus on, evaluating past progress and adapting to the community's evolving needs.

She's also an advocate for equitable education, having represented her peers in Olympia, and regularly volunteers at **2nd Harvest** to fight food insecurity.

Her initiative, leadership, and commitment to youth wellness make Gydance an inspiring example of community-driven change. **We are proud to have her in The ZONE!**

Expanded Learning for Youth

School-based Before/After/Summer Programming

We have 8 ZONE schools participating in **21st Century Learning Center** grants now. This initiative provides academic support, enrichment activities, and wrap around resources for students and families. **Communities in Schools (CIS)** staff are embedded at each location coordinating before/after/summer student programming and ensuring foundational needs of students are met. Through our combined efforts we are **enhancing student learning, promoting social-emotional growth, and providing resources** necessary so children and youth can thrive. Over **55 community-based partners** come to these sites and offer activities, as well as the youth programming they conduct elsewhere in The ZONE.

Supporting Next Steps

This year GU engaged in a new partnership connecting **ZONE Indigenous students** to a **Gonzaga college experience**.

The high school students loved it, Zags sweatshirts included!

Quadrupling the amount of student participants to accommodate demand, GU staff will continue to connect with attendees through the **Native American Cultural Center**, ensuring Indigenous students have increased exposure to colleges while supporting their **development of the skills, knowledge, and confidence required to further explore postsecondary options**.



Spotlight: Slingshot

Our funding through **Slingshot** supported 28 graduated Pirates to **return to Rogers High School and share about their college experiences**. Graduates attending **Whitworth, Gonzaga, EWU, UW, WSU, SFCC, SCC, Morgan State, and Bellingham Tech College** hosted a meeting, and then met with individual students to talk about their campus.

This year The ZONE secured funding through a legislative proviso, alongside three other place-based initiatives in Washington, to become a **Youth Wellness Zone**. With data evaluation by **University of Washington CoLab**, the purpose is to have youth define, prioritize, and name strategies to support youth mental health and wellness. Community then comes alongside these young leaders and will action the recommendations. Survey information was collected from local schools and multiple youth led efforts like the **Chase Youth Commission** and **Youth Leadership Spokane**. Students at On Track Academy have created projects to reflect these priorities in our community. At the heart of their work is the belief that **wellness starts with community**. Stay tuned to our 2025 report as this effort continues.

Light a Lamp

The ZONE sponsors Light a Lamp's **Project Lift Up**, to support youth at **Shaw and Garry Middle Schools** who are facing anxiety, depression, and feelings of hopelessness. Mental health packs for students referred by school staff are delivered. Included are mental health resources, food/drink coupons, snacks, and hygiene products like lip balm, along with fun, yet useful items to brighten their day such as drawstring backpacks, journals, tumblers, fidget spinners, and anxiety rings. The goal is to **help students feel seen, and let them know that people care about them and their struggles**.



Youth Leadership

In January, two youth advocates, **Donaldada** and **Esmerelda**, had the opportunity to engage in an in-person conversation with **Mayor Brown** about a topic that matters to them: **housing insecurity**. They discussed how the lack of stable housing affects many youth in our community, **influencing aspects such as education, relationships, and overall well-being**.

Families receive on average a year of case management through our **Financial Opportunity Center**, focusing on credit-building, employment coaching, and increasing household income. They also gain access to support for all family members through embedded staff at schools and NECC.

Referrals are through agency partners and school sites where community staff funded by The ZONE engage with families to assess needs and connect them with services, ensuring wraparound, **2-generation support**.

This is a **DO TOGETHER** program, not a **DO FOR** program. Case managers mentor and guide participants to build skills and confidence in areas like job applications, banking, budgeting, and saving. Services are tailored to each participant's unique needs, and goals.




Economic Mobility



Financial coaching is the focus of our housing stability program and our participant-centered process as a Financial Opportunity Center. By helping participants identify patterns in their spending and saving habits, financial coaching empowers individuals to make informed decisions that lead to long-term stability. It not only assists in budgeting and managing debt but also helps households build savings, improve credit scores, and navigate financial challenges. Case managers empower families to maintain stable housing, create better financial futures, and ultimately improve their overall quality of life.

Wheel of Life

Case managers use the **Wheel of Life** to recognize the importance of each component and learn about their current situation. Together, they sit down and go around the wheel, indicating their level of satisfaction with each area. The perimeter of the circle can represent different topic areas including health, financial stability, employment, etc.

Culturally Aware Care & Expanding Access

Case managers in the housing stability program help families overcome barriers to securing stable housing. A challenge is the cultural stigma around debt, preventing clients from using credit to build wealth and independence.

To address this, case managers provide financial coaching to help participants understand credit as a tool for stability. **Amanda Randall** and **Lavonne Mcmanus** participated in the **Credit Building Program** with **Credit Builders Alliance** to enhance their coaching. They assist households with opening bank accounts and building credit scores.

Language barriers are addressed using **BoostLingo** for clear communication through live interpretation in 300 languages. By working with landlords, employers, and offering tailored skill building, case managers walk beside families to successfully meet their goals. Goal examples are **increasing income, home ownership, education, and starting a business**.

Financial Opportunity Center

Exciting News: We are Now a Financial Opportunity Center!

The ZONE/NECC is now officially a Financial Opportunity Center (FOC) in partnership with **Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC)**! This builds upon our commitment empowering residents and building economic stability in Northeast Spokane.

The ZONE provides free, personalized support in three key areas:



Employment & Career Coaching:

Helping residents build skills, secure quality jobs, and advance their careers.



Financial Coaching:

One-on-one support to improve credit, reduce debt, and create long-term financial goals.



Benefits Cliff Navigation:

Reducing fear and supporting households when benefits end as their household income increases.

24/7 Dad Class

DCYF (Washington Department of Children, Youth and Families) funds classes to support emotional regulation in dads at NECC, facilitated by the Spokane Fatherhood Initiative. For six weeks four hours a week, cohorts of eight participants reflect on how they were parented and how they parent-building connections that last long after graduation.

Essential Skills

Our Essential Skills Program continues to provide valuable support for women in our community, helping them build the skills needed to succeed in the workforce. It is in partnership with **Gonzaga University, Catholic Charities, and Greater Spokane Inc. (GSI)**.

This **six-week, 96 hour course** focuses on areas including computer literacy, interview techniques, and career exploration, with childcare provided at no cost to participants. **Through the program, women have gained confidence, expanded their professional networks, and discovered new opportunities for personal and career growth.**



Spotlight:

This year, we're excited to welcome **Mandie Norman** as our new **Vocational Navigator & Wellness Coordinator**. She started as an Essential Skills participant, then became the facilitator, and is now working full-time at The ZONE.



Program Highlights:

Skill Building: Participants enhance computer skills, learn to create professional presentations, and gain technical knowledge for the workplace.

Confidence Growth: Women build self-assurance to pursue employment or further education opportunities.

Career Exploration: Participants identify strengths and discover career paths aligning with their interests.

Community Support: The program fosters a supportive network of women, sharing resources and advice. Alumni events to connect all cohorts are held annually.

Parenting Insights: Women exchange parenting tips in a peer-led setting, balancing family and career goals.

Access to Opportunities: Participants connect with internships, resources, and continuing education options to move forward in their careers.

Networking: Participants are connected to potential employment prospects and women leaders in our community, recognizing that 80% of jobs are obtained through personal connections.
